

Chrome books purchased for any new PP children	During the first lockdown it was evident that many families were unable to access online provision. These children were not engaged with learning and made less progress than other children. This was mainly due to lack of devices for a whole family to use.	4,5
Financial support for music tuition	Improved self-esteem. Increased opportunities to perform and feel successful	3,4

## Pupil premium strategy outcomes
